TOREY LOVULLO BIO – 2024:

Torey Lovullo enters 2025 in his ninth season managing the Arizona Diamondbacks and his 25th overall coaching in professional baseball. As the longest-tenured and winningest manager in franchise history, Lovullo led the D-backs to the National League Wild Card game in 2017 during his first season at the helm, earning him National League Manager of the Year honors. In 2023, he guided the club to their second National League pennant following a dramatic seven-game series against the Philadelphia Phillies to secure the franchise's first World Series berth in 22 years.

Known for his strong leadership and ability to connect with players and staff, Lovullo's approach focuses on empowering his team, allowing them to take ownership of their roles while providing the support and guidance they need to succeed. He works hard to ensure that all feel valued both on and off the field, an approach heavily influenced by Hall-of-Fame manager, Sparky Anderson, whom he played for with the Detroit Tigers.

Off the field, Lovullo is deeply committed to giving back and making a positive impact in the community, by regularly participating in charitable and youth initiatives, including "Torey Lovullo's Kindness Champions," a program launched in the summer of 2024 in partnership with Ben's Bells and Positive Coaching Alliance to help promote kind behavior in schools through education, skill development and removing barriers. In November 2024, the D-backs and Arizona Public Service dedicated Snowflake Little League Baseball Park to Lovullo, marking the organization's 45th field to be built or refurbished as part of the Mike Kennedy Diamonds Back Fields Program, an honor Lovullo humbly accepted and, in his speech stated, "It's on fields like this where dreams are born."

Lovullo's professional baseball career began as a player when he was drafted out of UCLA in 1987, primarily as a utility infielder, playing for several teams over parts of eight MLB seasons with the Tigers, New York Yankees, California Angels, Seattle Mariners, Oakland A's, Cleveland Indians and Phillies. He transitioned to coaching and managerial roles following his playing career in 2001, earning opportunities with Cleveland, Toronto and Boston, including serving as bench coach with the Red Sox during their 2013 World Series championship run.

Lovullo is a dedicated family man and enjoys a close-knit family life, married to Kristen, with three children, Nick, Taylor and Connor.
